Family and Consumer Sciences e-Connection – January 2014

Dear Colleagues:

Over the last few months I have been reading about the early years of Extension's family and consumer sciences work. Several key concepts seem consistent across what I read.

- Our work was reflective of the needs of the time. We addressed issues based on what was happening in communities and society, just like we do today.
- We were founded to contribute to the economic wellbeing of communities. A 1927 circular from the USDA talked about the first 10 years of Home Management Extension, stating "the ultimate goal in any agricultural and home economics extension program has been to make possible a better standard of living for the farm family by the full capitalization of the material resources at its command." That is still our role today, to make sure families have a better standard of living because they are managing their economic and personal resources.
- Our work was rooted in social movements. In the early 1900's there were major movements to address health and sanitation. We were there educating families about handling food and caring for their homes. During World War 1 the country was committed to supporting the soldiers in Europe, and we were doing our part by helping families prevent food waste so the soldiers would have enough in Europe. The Women's Suffrage movement was swelling, and we were supporting the education of women and girls to be stronger contributors to the economic success of their family's farming enterprise. Today, we are leaders and partners in such movements as those around local foods, prevention of childhood obesity, homeownership, and food security.

As we go into celebrating the centennial, it is important to celebrate the past, but more important that we look to the future. I challenge you to celebrate our future throughout the year, highlighting how we are still being reflective of our times, contributing to the wellbeing of communities, and helping society move forward.

To highlight Extension's centennial, OSU Extension, Lucas County will be promoting healthy celebrations for families throughout the year. A Master of Public Health student is partnering with OSU Extension, Family and Consumer Sciences to create a 3-class series for families in Lucas County in March 2014. The title of the program is "Celebrating Fun and Fit Families." Families will learn about healthy habits and make goals to plan their own family celebrations in easy, fun, healthy ways. With the help of the Public Health intern, the Lucas County Family and Consumer Sciences team (including FCS, EFNEP and SNAP-Ed) is creating a handout for families about healthy celebrations and tying in the 100 years of Extension. This handout will be used at classes and at displays throughout the year promoting the Extension's 100 years. In 2014, the Lucas County fair will have a special competition promoting healthy celebrations. The competition will be similar to the current Senior Fair "Table Setting for Two" but in addition to the table setting, participants will also highlight their healthy meal menu as part of the display. At the fair in July, Extension will have displays, FCS (as well as other program areas) will give community presentations and the 100 year (healthy) celebration for Extension will be part of the fair ceremonies.

USDA AWARDS GRANTS FOR NEW SCHOOL FOOD SERVICE EQUIPMENT TO HELP SCHOOLS IMPROVE THE QUALITY OF MEALS

In addition to the District of Columbia and Guam, 14 states were selected to receive grants based on free- and reduced-price participation in the National School Lunch Program and greatest unmet need. They are Arkansas, California, Illinois, Maine, Michigan, Mississippi, Missouri, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Oregon, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, and Washington. States will competitively award the funds to school districts to purchase needed equipment, with priority given to districts serving a high percentage of low-income children.
